Goal: Each student at Lutheran High School will select one or more areas of servant-hood in which he/she will offer a minimum of 10 hours for the semester of servant-hood.

Biblical Basis – 1 Peter 4:9-11

“Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully, administering God’s grace in its various forms. If anyone serves, he should do it with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory and the power forever and ever. Amen.”

The purpose of the “Servant-Leader” component of your four years at LHS is to offer an opportunity for you to put your faith in action. The lessons learned from being a servant to others cannot be learned in a book or through observation. Servant-hood is an act of selflessness. Servant-hood is humbling yourself, and giving of yourself in an effort to bring the love, joy, hope, and presence of Jesus Christ into the lives of others (Matthew 25). The goal of this ministry opportunity is that you would realize the great example and influences you have when being a servant. Before one can lead they must serve, and God calls us to servant-hood. We are reminded that it is by our example, BEING Christ to others, that the Lord can work through us to bring people to faith (1 Peter 2:12). Service is done out of love for neighbor and not just the need to check off assignment as Peter reminds us.

Types of Service Choices

It is most logical that you choose an area of service in which you know God has gifted you and in which you are somewhat comfortable. There are hundreds of servant-hood options that exist within the community, your congregations, hospitals, nursing homes, for the elderly, homeless, single parents, cleanup, repair, rescue missions, schools, money for missions, building, overseas projects, mission trips, servant projects, youth group projects, and the list continues endlessly. You may work on this servant-hood project as a group or individually. This can be in a large or in a small way. You or another person may not receive payment or any physical remuneration (ie – a letter for a letter jacket) for your servant-hood.

Timing of Service and Eligibility of Service Hours

Any service hours done during the summer must be turned in within the first three weeks of the beginning of the school year. If those hours are not submitted, they will not count towards the semester requirements. All other hours must be turned in no later than the final exam. No service hours conducted during the first semester will be counted for the second semester.

Service hours second semester are split. Five hours must be earned in each quarter of the second semester. This pattern reinforces that service should be ongoing not merely in bursts. This may make getting hours a bit more challenging and requires our students to plan their service with greater diligence. All hours must be submitted before the quarter is finished.
