Sheboygan Lutheran kicks off new capital campaign

Sheboygan Lutheran High celebrated 45 years of Christian education this past year. We celebrated with an all-class reunion at a local brewery where every decade was represented with at least a tables-worth of alumni. We'll be doing that again soon! And a second evening of fellowship and reminiscing was held in the atrium of our Performing Arts Center where we gathered for munchies and held a spirited cornhole tournament on the theater stage. It was a hoot! LHS has had the privilege of preparing over 1,800 alumni through quality education, spiritual guidance, and extracurricular enrichment throughout its 45-year history. May Christ be our leader as we press on toward our 50th anniversary and beyond.

For the past 10 years, a highlight of my job has been creating and organizing events for the school to meet the school's goals: the dinner auction fundraiser, the golf outing, the Taproot Club events, the Community Family Fair outreach event, open houses and other recruitment initiatives, and anniversary and alumni gatherings, to name a few. As our Board of Directors and administration look to revise the school's governance policy and call a new Executive Director, I have stepped in to serve as the Development Director. In this expanded role, I will be fostering donor relations and implementing Lutheran High's *Impact Tomorrow Today* capital campaign, which was launched to retire the debt incurred from the construction of the Worship and Fine Arts Center.

In 2020, dreams were realized. Thanks to our most successful capital campaign to date, donors to the *Preparing for the Future* campaign raised over \$4.7 million to bring this expansion project to life. The addition of the state-of-the-art facility showcases the talents of Lutheran High students in fine arts, science, and technology, and also provides a venue for community use and outreach. In the three years since the expansion's completion, more than 15,000 people have been through the doors, and we've been blessed by the impact:

- 15 concerts with 4,400 attendees
- 12 community events with 4,000 attendees
- 7 musicals and drama performances with 2,600 attendees
- 6 community worship services with 2,200 attendees
- 5 dance recitals with 1,500 attendees
- 2 Lutheran association grade school graduation services with 600 attendees
- Plus, bi-weekly chapel services for more than 200 LHS students and faculty

With more funding needed to retire our loan before interest rates increase in 2026, we are in debt-reduction mode to position LHS on a solid financial path as we approach our 50th anniversary. The guiding verse for the campaign is from Psalm 145:4: "One generation shall commend your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts." While we give thanks for and celebrate our current Crusader student body, preparation for the next generation of Christian leaders starts now. The success of this campaign significantly impacts the future of Sheboygan Lutheran High School.

It's a relationship with and commitment to students, families, and our community. God gives us gifts and talents, and LHS helps students discover, use, and strengthen these gifts. We're thankful for the opportunities the expansion has created for our family, and we're more excited for LHS's future."

A "Neat" Renovation

Neat Repeats Thrift Store gets a fresh new look

"It looks like a brand new store. I love the bright new look!" That's what customers and volunteers alike are saying about the newly renovated Neat Repeats Store. Located on Eastern Avenue in Plymouth, Neat Repeats is a thrift store that has supported Sheboygan Lutheran High School since it opened in June of 2009. After exploring the possibility of moving into a portion of the vacant K-Mart store, the Neat Repeats Board of Directors decided to sign a new 10-year lease to remain in its present location.

Neat Repeats has established a significant footprint in the Plymouth community. Increasing support for the store comes from donors and shoppers across Sheboygan County and beyond. It just seemed like the timing was right to renovate the 19,000 square-foot store. With a new long-term outlook, a complete renovation project was led by three co-chairs: Paul TenPas, a retired officer of the Kohler Co., Tom Rusch, retired Facilities Manager at Sheboygan Lutheran High School, and Laura Herrmann, longtime Neat Repeats Store Manager.

"The renovation of the store included new LED lighting, new ceiling tile, new flooring, painting of all walls coordinated by volunteer Jim Fasse, and remodeled customer bathrooms," commented Paul TenPas. "It was an enormous challenge to move all store fixtures (clothing racks, shelving, etc.) as well as the store inventory in order to coordinate the various renovation activities, and to then put everything back together in a short period of time. It was fulfilling to see not only our regular volunteers but also many other supporters of Neat Repeats and Lutheran High unselfishly give of their time and talents to do whatever was necessary to complete the project on schedule and on budget, while only closing the store for two days!"

Led by contracted professionals and a host of volunteers, the \$100,000+ renovation project took place in a time span of three weeks. Many 'after store hours' of work were required. The reassembling of the entire store proved to be almost as daunting a task as the remodeling. But the results are amazing!

When Laura Herrmann, Neat Repeats Store Manager, was asked how these improvements will benefit the shoppers, she replied, "At Neat Repeats, we pride ourselves on having a store that is neat, clean, and well-organized. The customer bathrooms are especially appealing, with new fixtures donated by the Kohler Co., new sinks, comfort-height facilities, and non-slip flooring. The new LED lights and carpet make the store appear brighter and more open. The new carpet is much nicer to walk on. The project makes for a pleasant experience for volunteers and customers."

Laura further stated, "We took a leap of faith when we opened the store, and we have seen God's hand in guiding Neat Repeats every step of the way. Nobody anticipated the success we have experienced in the 14 years the store has been open. The future of our store certainly looks bright (no pun intended). We are thankful to everyone who helped with the renovation, and to our volunteers, donors, and shoppers. Their support has helped to make our store successful and helped the ministry of Sheboygan Lutheran High School."

NEW Class Offering

Mr. Matt Holman launches Layout & Design course

Sheboygan Lutheran's newest class, Layout and Design, provides students with the ability to learn techniques in the Adobe Illustrator, InDesign and Photoshop programs, by completing individual assignments and design projects for the school. The class is taught by LHS art teacher, Mr. Matt Holman, who holds degrees in commercial art and K-12 art education from Concordia University, Nebraska.


The class has worked on design projects for the athletic department, designing the senior banners for the volleyball and cross country teams, and for the music and drama departments, designing the promotional materials and posters for the fall sampler concert and fall mystery drama. Students have been learning the basics of image adjustment in Photoshop, the principles of layout and design using InDesign, and drawing vector-based artwork and text in Illustrator.

The seven students in the class will be working on other exciting projects this fall, which includes athletic posters for the seniors in basketball, promotional posters to share with local schools and churches, and the Christmas program cover and promotional materials.

The design students have been utilizing the school's brand new Hewlett Packard Z6 banner printer, which holds paper and banner material rolls up to 42 inches wide and up to 200 feet long. The printer can print in very high resolution (on a variety of media surfaces, from papers to special vinyl material) even with large files, providing photo-quality prints of posters and banners. It has been a real game changer for our students and marketing efforts! We are truly blessed at Sheboygan Lutheran for the Z6 printer, generously gifted by LHS supporter, Jay Christopher. Not only are we able to print our own signage and banners, we are laying the groundwork for a design and print service business that we plan to offer to the Sheboygan Area Lutheran Schools Association (SALSA) and other local organizations.



Junior Crusaders

Growing up green & gold

Sheboygan Lutheran High School has been blessed with many programs that, by any standard, can be called **successful**.

- Academics. When considering our teachers, courses, college test scores, graduation rates, Christian leaders who have graduated from our school, by any standard we are blessed through academics. Successful.
- Music. Starting with humble beginnings to what our music program is today, including beautiful concerts, professional musicals, and the Performing Arts Center, by any standard.
- The 2022-2023 Jr. Crusader girls' teams at Fiserv Forum to cheer on the Milwaukee Bucks
- musicals, and the Performing Arts Center, by any standard we are blessed through music. **Successful.** *Athletics*. Displayed in the hallways and trophy cases is evidence of athletic achievement. In addition, there are countless examples
- of student success through participation, lessons learned, and leadership skills. We are blessed through athletics. **Successful.** Fundraising Programs or 3rd Source Income. From the beginning over 45 years ago. LHS has relied on programs to generate
- Fundraising Programs or 3rd Source Income. From the beginning over 45 years ago, LHS has relied on programs to generate financial support. Capital campaigns, annual appeals, Taproot Club, and Neat Repeats are all examples of fundraising programs that by any standard are blessed. Once again, **successful**.

To this list, we can add the category of Junior Crusaders. The Junior Crusader program combines instruction of athletic skills, sportsmanship, and team play with developing a sense of belonging to the Lutheran High School family from a young age forward (typically 3rd-8th grades). This program has had a profound impact on our young people's lives, on the development of "team," on the strengthening of their faith, on the development of young Christian leaders, on the building of the LHS athletic program, and not the least, on Sheboygan Lutheran's enrollment effort.

There are a number of opportunities available to Junior Crusaders, such as Todd Dekker's basketball camps, Jeff Jurss's Slamma Jamma basketball camps (for the younger players); Lisa Klapperich's volleyball program and summer camp; and Tim Muth's summer baseball camp, to name a few. However, youth basketball is the program to which the Junior Crusader name is most commonly applied. The Junior Crusader boys' program has been in operation for almost 20 years. Originated by Mike Leibham and assisted by a long list of coaches, this is a big part of the pre-high school basketball program. The girls' program, which began only a few years ago, is led by Tyler Thomas, Sheboygan Lutheran's current girls' varsity basketball coach. Chuck Benedum sat down with these two leaders, and here's what they had to say about the Jr. Crusader program.

Mike Leibham, Coach and Pioneer of the Boys' Jr. Crusader Program

What was the original goal of the Junior Crusader Program? To get the SALSA school players together, grow the basketball program, and help enrollment at LHS grow.

What are the core principles? Respect, Commitment, Accountability, Faith. Athletes and parents sign a code of conduct agreement that reflects these principles.

What keeps you and other assistant coaches so involved in a program that requires a significant time commitment? Being able to see the kids grow into Christian leaders, being able to see the kids grow in their basketball skills. (NOTE: Mike is an LHS alumnus and is "green and gold" throughout. He is committed to LHS. This is one way for him and his key assistants, like LHS boys' varsity basketball coach, Nick Verhagen, to give back.)

How has the program changed over the years? There has been growth...from around 10 players to over 100 players weekly (program of Skills and Thrills runs October through April on Sunday

afternoons). The program has also expanded: There are eight teams that play in leagues as well as tournament teams that travel. Finally, the program now includes younger players, all the way down to kindergarten-age.

What would be your main wish for the program? Space! Lutheran High's gym is used morning to night. It's hard to find available space that works with available time.

How do you mesh this program with the respective elementary school programs? Grade school programs always come first. We work together to find available time and space. We also try to balance and respect family time as well.

Is this a program designed for the highly skilled athlete? Absolutely not. The program is designed for all skill levels. There is a commitment of time and dollars (Skills and Thrills on Sunday is \$1/day; league and tournament players contribute a little more.)

What are the overall goals of the program? Kids make decisions early on where they would like to go to school. We want the kids and parents to see LHS as a great place to grow and develop both as players and as Christian leaders. We want to have an impact on their lives. We want to help them reach their potential, on and off the court. We pray before and after practice and games. We want people to see that is a big part of who we are. We have actually had families enroll in our local Lutheran grade schools or at LHS because of the impact of the Junior Crusader program.

Tyler Thomas, Girls' Varsity Basketball Coach & Head of Girls' Jr. Crusader Program

How long has the Junior Crusader Girls' program been going? The actual program, gym time and teams, is quite new, only in existence around four years. We are open to girls in grades 2-8, with all skill levels. There are no cuts; all play.

How has the program impacted LHS? The easy answer is to develop the girls' skills, individually and team-wise. It is very important to have the girls and their parents in the LHS building and see what the LHS program is all about. It is an important recruiting program for LHS.

For whom is the program organized? And how do you get the word out? The program is organized to supplement the SALSA (Sheboygan Area Lutheran Schools Association) program. It, like the boys' program, always respects the school program first. We have targeted SALSA schools as well as Catholic schools, like Christ Child Academy, through email and social media.

What is your most important wish for the program? Numbers! We would love to see a large increase in girls participating. We would love to see over 100 girls in the LHS building.

What keeps you so involved with Junior Crusaders when you're already so busy with coaching high school basketball? I love to see the kids grow into young Christian people and Christian leaders. That's very rewarding. Certainly it helps grow the girls' Crusader basketball program. And for sure, it is an important enrollment tool for LHS.

What separates the Junior Crusader program from other program options? First and foremost, is our shared Christianity. Our faith. We pray together as we grow together. There is an emphasis on family - we respect family time, especially on weekends. We grow together as a "family affair," as there are many schools represented in our program, as opposed to all coming from one school.

Finally, what are your goals for the program? 1. Grow in their faith. 2. Develop as basketball players - individually and in team play. 3. Teach valuable life lessons; we win or lose always with humility and dignity.

Robb Leonhard, Former Junior Crusader Coach, Parent of Former Junior Crusader Players, and Current LHS Parent

Twelve years ago, I had a strong attachment to North High School having played basketball there in the mid- to late-80s. I also had a strong commitment to Sheboygan North Coach, Tom Desotell. Coach was super successful, and he drilled into us strong Christian core values at a public school. With Coach retiring and the public schools deteriorating, we knew from the time we stepped into Sheboygan Lutheran High School 12 years ago, it was the place for our boys. We saw a basketball "Skills and Thrills" flyer at St. John Lutheran School in Plymouth. Pastor Meador, the pastor at St. John at that time, was a basketball junkie, and he thought it would be a good idea for my boys to attend these sessions. Skills and Thrills was held every Sunday afternoon at Sheboygan Lutheran. At the time, it was organized and run by Mike Leibham. For young kids that already played on a school team, the Sunday afternoon Skills and Thrills was a good option for working on fundamentals. I took my sons, Max, Ben, and Zach, to Skills and Thrills every Sunday for many years. Some of the fundamentals they learned were to look people in the eye when you talk with them, be a great listener, shake hands like you mean it, and of course respect, commitment, and accountability.

I had been blessed with the opportunity to coach at Skills and Thrills and Junior Crusaders for ten years. My boys also joined Junior Crusader basketball teams which, at the time, played in the Sheboygan Rec. Department league. The Junior Crusader teams eventually transitioned to the Northeast Wisconsin Boys Basketball League (NWBBL) which offered a higher level of competition. As the Junior Crusader program grew and matured, the Crusader teams found that they were outgrowing the competition levels of the NWBBL. That is when the Crusader teams began entering more tournaments. The Junior Crusader program has had a profound effect on the high school and the basketball program. It has had an even greater effect on the many young Christian athletes that have participated in the program. We were very blessed to have the opportunity to participate in the program.

1989 and 1992 Crusader volleyball teams ace the conference

1989

The late 80s and early 90s were a time for volleyball success as teams either won championships or were close to winning the title. Strong performances in Conference, in the Sheboygan County Tournament, and in State competition marked these two teams, and also the other volleyball teams from this era. The architect of the volleyball program was Coach Julie Reseburg, now retired but the longest serving faculty member in LHS history. Eighteen years of varsity coaching and eighteen years of freshmen coaching have earned her well-deserved accolades for what has become a key program in LHS athletics. Julie shared that both of these squads, and the others in this era, were characterized by their love of volleyball, the deep care and concern for their teammates, and their positive attitude, even in tough times.

1989 Volleyball Conference Championship Team

The 1989 girls' volleyball team became our school's 7th Conference Champion. They set the record in volleyball for the best record (10-1) and they placed second in the very difficult Sheboygan County Tournament. By any definition, it was a successful season. Coach Reseburg commented on the strong senior leadership (3 seniors were playing their 3rd year of varsity volleyball), and noted the 1992 team who made it to

The State Tournament Championship began well after 8 p.m. and went until after 10 p.m. The girls really never set "State" as a goal, so they were thrilled to be the runner-up. All players worked hard, no matter their role. "Don't let the ball hit the floor on our side" was a goal. They were relentless, a key characteristic of players and managers in their respective roles. See your ministry gifts in action

IRA. RMD. QCD. AGI. 70.5. 72. 73. 75. Alphabet soup, right?! Traditional IRAs have many rules and tax laws associated with them. If you are not staying on top of those IRS regulations with your RMD, you could be missing out on a number of tax saving opportunities. Let's explore a quick story regarding traditional IRAs.

A faithful husband and wife created a sizable estate through years of work. Faithful in worship attendance, they have had many opportunities to engage in ministry at their congregation as well as at Sheboygan Lutheran High School. Their three children attended LHS, and they were blessed to participate and watch their children grow into faithful servant leaders.

Fast forward a few decades. This couple is now closer to the day when the Lord will call them home to Him. Their attitude has changed about their earthly possessions. Several years ago, they decided they were going to start giving from assets they had planned to give family in the future. Sitting down with Craig Toerpe, LCMS Foundation Gift Planner, he was able to share with this couple the right asset(s) to leave to their three children and which asset(s) to leave to ministry. They both had a sizable traditional IRA, to which they contributed during their working years. And they were taking the required minimum distribution (RMD), claiming it as ordinary income, and then writing their firstfruit offering checks to St. John's. However, once Craig explained some of the tax benefits on which they were missing out, the couple began working with Craig and their financial advisor to review their original gift plan. They asked the question, "What would we have to do to give this now?" Being older, they could take advantage of the qualified charitable deduction (QCD) that allows those over 70 ½ years old to transfer up to \$100,000 per year to charity. By utilizing the QCD, they also did not have to worry about triggering higher taxes or possibly decreasing the amount received from social security. This couple also did not realize high income in retirement could also make Medicare premiums more expensive.
