Some may look at athletics, others at extracurriculars, while some may focus on issues that occurred or lack thereof. We have the blessing of knowing that we have given our students the tools to be Christian leaders in their everyday life.

It's true, Lutheran High is a different type of school. We assess our students on more than just academic successes. We assess ourselves on more than just graduation rates and high ACT averages (both are excellent at LHS). We assess ourselves on the fact that God's Word is taught in our classrooms, faith is important to our teachers and students, Chapel is lead by Christian leaders and Pastors, students are learning scripture and how to defend their faith, and by the end of their four years they have been involved in churches and nonprofits throughout the community.

We also saw numerous other incredible things this year. In fall 2021, we welcomed more than 60 freshmen to our halls. Our seniors received \$2.5 million in scholarships – five of whom are pursuing churchwork through teaching. We had a four-year first place rating at the state forensics competition (which earns a lifetime achievement award), state music award winners in both vocal and instrumental music, a state football passing record and the state championship in soccer. Incredible!

New staff members joined the Lutheran High family this year. We welcomed Jacob Jurss in social studies, Megan Tews in math, Paige Schrader in math, and Sharon Stellwagen for girls' health. We even had a student teacher from Concordia Wisconsin, Matthew Ziemer. With bittersweet feelings we congratulate Ken Witte, who after 46 years of teaching of which 22 were at LHS, has decided to retire. We pray for Matthew Thiel, Jen Hahn, and Samantha Wetenkamp who are leaving LHS and beginning the next chapter of their lives as they take on new roles or new challenges.

Thank you to our association churches and all our Lutheran schools for their partnership and support, instilling the right priorities in our students and families. With great commitment comes great sacrifice and through your prayers, participation, and financial support we stand together for a strong future educating our students and promoting each other to be strong and courageous Christian leaders.

As we are reminded by the banner in our gym - In Christ is the Victory.

During the Covid lockdowns and return-to-school efforts students were separated into two spaces on opposite ends of the school to provide ample space for


distancing. Well, the time has come to bring everyone back, and the students are excited.



The Numbers Add Up

For 46 years, Ken Witte served the Church and several schools in the classroom and on the field. He is a Christian example and humble in all that he does.

Ken came to Sheboygan Lutheran High in 2001 thanks to the influence of Dr. Cary Stelmachowicz, a fellow professor at Concordia Wisconsin, and the lure of a Distance Learning Center (which used to be in the back hall). Ken helped supervise the lab.

Once at Sheboygan Lutheran, he taught Advanced Algebra, Pre-Calculus and Calculus, Statistics, Personal Finance, and Transition to College Math. He's overseen the National Accreditation of the school, and coached Varsity Girls' Basketball and Girls' Soccer.

Living in Fredonia, Ken calculated that he has traveled more than 245,000 miles just driving to and from school daily. Now, if you multiply that by the price of gas... Ouch.

When asked about the biggest changes in math over the last few years, Ken responded with the need to innovate and get creative as math became more visual using new instruments and other devices. Yet he says math has become more purposeful in its application. There is less supervised homework now, and much more done in the classroom, but his mantra still stands true, "Communicate what you are thinking."

In retirement, Ken looks forward to a break from teaching, but as a life-long learner he will continue to look for opportunities of personal and professional growth.

Looking back at his favorite memories from Lutheran High, he remembers his children's achievements in and out of the classroom, the Ozaukee carpool, and seeing his students return after their graduations to share their stories of success.

Ken, you have been a true blessing from God to Lutheran High, its faculty, students, and parents. Your Christian example and your teaching expertise are treasures we will never forget. You will be missed in the Math Cave! God's blessings to you and Cindy as you begin a new phase of your life.

The event was held to encourage more schools to enter the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program, show legislators how the movement is growing in the state, and recognize the accomplishments of schools, parents, and children working together for the future of education. On May 11, LHS held its annual Honors Night. Students are recognized for departmental awards, scholarships, involvement, academics, and leadership & service recognition.

The LHS Class of 2022 is easy to describe as a class of leaders. They are involved in everything from athletics to service organizations. From this class, 39 are pursuing a 2- or 4-year degree from a college or university, six are going into the workforce, two will begin military service, and five are pursuing the ministry through teaching. For those pursuing the workforce, many already have full-time jobs lined up. For those attending college, this class averaged nearly \$65,000 per student for a total of \$2.5 million in scholarships and grants.

For the first time a scholarship was awarded to students who are pursuing ministry through education at our Concordia University System. Five students were awarded a \$5,000 scholarship by the Striegel family. It is truly a commitment to pursue Lutheran Education, and it is greatly needed across the country as we continue to face a shortage of teachers for our schools.

The evening always ends with the bittersweet Senior video. Congratulations to all the Freshmen through Seniors recognized this night for outstanding commitment to their own education.


Girls Softball


Boys Baseball
